Let us talk about Minority Mental Health Month!

July is time to bring some attention to National Minority Mental Health.

African Americans/ American Indians/ Alaska Natives/ Asian Americans / Hispanic/Latinos/ Pacific Islanders/ Native Hawaiians are populations that may receive less mental health services. In some cases, these may be primarily due to reasons of poverty and poor quality of healthcare.

Did you know, according to <u>www.minorityhealth.hhs.gov</u>:

- Suicide was the leading cause of death for Asian Americans, ages 15 to 24, in 2017.
- Asian American females, in grades 9-12, were 20 percent more likely to attempt suicide as compared to non-Hispanic white female students, in 2017.
- Southeast Asian refugees are at risk for post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) associated with trauma experienced before and after immigration to the U.S. One study found that 70% of Southeast Asian refugees receiving mental health care were diagnosed with PTSD.²

- The overall suicide rate for Asians Americans is half that of the non-Hispanic white population.
- In 2017, suicide was the second leading cause of death for African Americans, ages 15 to 24.¹
- The death rate from suicide for African American men was more than four times greater than for African American women, in 2017.
- However, the overall suicide rate for African Americans is 60 percent lower than that of the non-Hispanic white population.
- African American females, grades 9-12, were 70 percent more likely to attempt suicide in 2017, as compared to non-Hispanic white females of the same age.
- In 2017, suicide was the second leading cause of death for American Indian/Alaska Natives between the ages of 10 and 34.¹
- American Indian/Alaska Natives are twice as likely to experience the feeling that everything is an effort, all or most of the time, as compared to non-Hispanic whites.
- Violent deaths, unintentional injuries, homicide, and suicide, account for 75% of all mortality in the second decade of life for American Indian/Alaska Natives.²
- The overall death rate from suicide for American Indian/Alaska Native adults is about 20 percent higher as compared to the non-Hispanic white population.
- Adolescent American Indian/Alaska Native females, ages 15-19, have a death rate that is three times higher than for non-Hispanic white females in the same age groups.

These are sobering statistics that lead to questions. What are you going to do to acknowledge this month of July in observance of Minority Health Awareness Month? Have you considered just sharing this article? Have you considered bringing up the community conversation about this subject? It is very disturbing to know that because of systematic barriers, all cannot receive the equal behavioral health services that are needed. We can begin to start thinking about advocating for making changes to these systems to reduce the behavioral mental health barriers for minority people in our communities. Remember, we live in a world strengthened through diversity.
